From the Rabbi's Study...



One *Rosh Hashanah* morning, the rabbi noticed little Mollie was staring up at the large plaque that hung in the foyer of the synagogue. It was covered with names, and small American flags were mounted on either side of it. The seven-year old had been staring at the plaque for some time, so the rabbi walked up, stood beside the girl, and said quietly, "Good morning, Mollie." "Good morning, Rabbi,"

replied the young girl, still focused on the plaque. "Rabbi Bernstein, what is this?" Mollie asked. "Well, it's a memorial to all the young men and women who died in the service." Soberly, they stood together, staring at the large plaque. Little Mollie's voice was barely audible when she asked: "Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur?"

In a few weeks we will once again gather together as a congregation on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, collectively known as the Yamim Noraim – the Days of Awe. So many of us walk into the shul longing to feel that awe and expecting to be somehow transformed. We expect the clergy to do their magic, to make us a better person, to make us feel something spiritual. And although the liturgy and the music is designed to awaken our emotions and help us reflect upon the meaning of our existence in the world, in the end it is our responsibility to transform ourselves into better people and create that spiritual feeling. After all, one could not expect to accomplish anything worthwhile in life without putting in the required amount of preparation and hard work. This is why we begin preparing ourselves for the Days of Awe a full month in advance during the month of Elul. We sound the shofar each morning and we recite the special penitential psalm reminding us to think about our lives and our relationships, prompting us into reflection and self-transformation, so when we come together on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur we are in the proper mindset for meaningful prayer that will hopefully fill our souls with a feeling of awe.

There is no one method to achieve these goals. Each person has to find their own path. Transformation is also an ongoing process. I would suggest working on one specific goal and aspect of your life that you would like to improve each year. For example, if you feel alone and disconnected from family and friends, call family members or friends with whom you have been out of touch and reconnect with them. As the month progresses, you'll begin to feel better about yourself and about life. Or if you would like to be a more giving and charitable person, begin putting aside some money for charity each day during the month of *Elul*, or volunteer your time to help those in need. You'll be amazed how uplifting and invigorating these acts of loving-kindness will be, so when you walk into *shul* on that first day of *Rosh Hashanah*, you will be ready to engage in a meaningful way, already transformed into a more sensitive and

We will seat a standing Finance and Budget Committee who will mind our checkbook and expenditures, so to speak, and make sure we deterrmine ways to stay on track.

KIDDUSH ON ROSH HASHANAH

Inasmuch as most prayerbooks do not contain the daytime Rosh Hashanah *Kiddush* recited before luncheon upon returning home from the synagogue, we are furnishing the text for your information:

תַּקְעוּ בַּחָדֶשׁ שוֹפָר, בַּבֶּסֶה לְיוֹם חַגֵּנוּ. בִּי חֹק לִישָׂרָאֵל הוֹא, מִשְׁפָּט לֵאלֹהֵי יַעַקֹב.

Tik-u bachodesh shofar, bakeseh l'yom chagaynu. ki chok l'yisrael hu, mishpat lay-lohay Yaakov.

(סֶבְרִי מֶרָנֶן וְרַבָּנֶן וְרַבּוֹתַי) בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה ה׳ אֱלֹקֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא פָּרִי הַנֶּפָּן.

TASHLICH

Tashlich comes from the Hebrew word meaning "to cast," referring to the intent to cast away our sins via this meaningful and ancient Jewish custom common to both Ashkenazi and Sephardic communities, and is performed on the first day of Rosh Hashanah (Second day if first day is Shabbat).

Tashlich is preferably recited alongside a body of water containing fish, to remind us that just as fish are protected by the water in which they live, we pray to be protected by G-d. Also, just as fish swim freely and can suddenly be caught in a net, so too we can just as helplessly fall into the net of sin. And even as the eyes of fish are always open, so do we pray that G-d, too, will keep a vigilant watch over his people.

Needless to say, the physical motions near the water and fish of *Tashlich* are not what grant us atonement. But if we pay attention to the symbolism and apply the sincere desire to heal our relationship with G-d as portrayed in the physical demonstrations of *Tashlich*, then it serves as a crucial part in the process of repenting and returning to G-d in purity.

Please join in and participate in the *Tashlich* service by meeting on the first day of *Rosh Hashanah*, Monday, September 14 at 105th and Conser over Indian Creek at approximately 5:45 p.m. *Tashlich* will conclude in time to return to the synagogue for the 6:15 p.m. *Mincha* and *Yom Tov Maariv*.

K.I. BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING HELD AUGUST 12TH

This is a brief synopsis of the K.I. Board of Directors meeting held August 12, 2015. It is not representative of the full minutes but should provide an overview on the activities of your board. If there are any questions, they should be directed to a board member for further information.

Blair Hawkins, director of security for the Kansas City Jewish Community, spoke on the importance of security training for as many people on the board as possible. He said that everyone has a role to play by reporting anything unusual.

K.I. will help build a *Mitzvah* House on Sunday, November 22, from 8:00 am – 3:30 pm. Volunteers ages 16 & up are needed, and no experience is necessary. Lunch will be provided at the site. The *Mitzvah* House is a project the entire Jewish community in Kansas City is participating in through Habitat for Humanity. For more information, contact **Ari Lubowicz** or **Clint Gillom**. You can also sign up at kisyn.org.

Recommendations from the Governance/Communications Task Force included that a synopsis of each board meeting should be included in the *Focal Point*, the next board meeting agenda should be in the *Focal Point* immediately preceding it, and, at the annual meeting, the congregation should be provided a published synopsis of the congregational finances and have a chance to ask questions. The Governance/Communications Task Force also recommended that Revenue, Budget & Finance, and Investment Committees be established.

Recommendations from the Membership/Programming Task Force included having a delegate at *Shabbat* services who is responsible for welcoming visitors and infrequent attendees. The process of meeting with potential new members, engaging current members, and coordinating new members' socials should be formalized. Also, establish a committee to organize *Mitzvah* Day once a year as well as monthly volunteer opportunities for members of the congregation.

The Clergy/Services Task Force meeting was delayed and their recommendations will be presented at the next board meeting, which is scheduled for Wednesday, October 14.

The board is working on approving sections of a new K.I. policy manual, and Section 3 was approved. Section 3 deals with accessibility, anti-harassment, whistleblower, grievance, administrative records, and facility management.

Grand Givers is Saturday, November 14th. Besides Dreiseszun Grand Givers (those who buy or sell at least \$10,000 worth of tickets), Grand Givers (those who buy or sell at least \$2,000 worth of tickets), we are actively promoting a new category of Corporate Sponsorships of \$2,000 and greater. This year's entertainment is The Second City Comedy Troupe from Chicago. The committee is working on details to make this the best Grand Givers ever!

The K.I. Allan Greenberg Memorial Annual Golf Tournament netted over \$40,000 this year! Next year's tournament is scheduled for Monday, June 20, 2016.

The K.I. Blue Ridge Cemetery Committee is taking bids for repairs at the cemetery. The property next to the cemetery was recently approved to be rezoned for light industrial business. The committee is also exploring the feasibility of purchasing an adjacent parcel of land to the north.

Sam Devinki and **Arnie Caviar** are working together to start a capital campaign to fund an assistant rabbi and major capital improvements. **Craig Caplan** appointed **Rick Simon** as our new treasurer, replacing Ari Lubowicz, who remains on the board. Hal Bordy has resigned as a board member due to moving out of town.

We have lots of exciting upcoming programming that was discussed. Look for flyers in the *Focal Point* and eblasts. Also, be sure to check out kisyn.org and the weekly *Shabbat* bulletins.

Other miscellaneous items were discussed, and the meeting was adjourned.

This year the Annual *Kehilath Israel* Blue Ridge Cemetery Memorial Service is scheduled to be held on Sunday, September 20, the Sunday before *Yom Kippur*, at 11:00 a.m.

The annual service, led by Rabbi Jeffrey Shron, will be held in the Jack Chernikoff-Louis Dolginow Memorial Chapel at the *Kehilath Israel* Blue Ridge Chapel, 1901 Blue Ridge Boulevard, Independence, Mo.

It is the Jewish tradition during this High Holiday period to visit the *Kever Avot*, the graves of our forebearers. Since it would be inconvenient for many to attend the service on a weekday between *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur*, Sunday, September 20 was selected.

Customarily, each individual recites the *Molay Rachamim* prayer, a "Prayer of Consolation," at the gravesite of their loved ones. The chapel prayer booklets are available for gravesite prayers. There is a selection of prayers in the booklet, found on pages 65 through 74, in both Hebrew and English. Please return the booklets to the chapel before leaving the cemetery.

Although the cemetery is maintained by *Kehilath Israel Synagogue*, the major building improvements, new walkways, monuments and other beautification is done primarily by private contributions. If you desire to assist in the program to improve and beautify the cemetery, an envelope for your contribution to this worthy cause is available at the desk near the front door of the chapel. FAMILY-TO-FAMILY NAMI EVENT SET TO BEGIN IN SEPTEMBER

Dealing with mental illness is a challenge for many – experts estimate that one in four Americans struggle with it in any given year.

Understanding mental illness and the issues that surround it is just part of the upcoming Family-to-Family course being offered by the Jewish Community Mental Health Coalition and NAMI (the National Alliance on Mental Illness).

The Family-to-Family Education Course is designed for families of people living with mental illness. This free, 12-week series of classes will be held on Wednesday evenings beginning Sept. 30, through December 23 (no class November 25), from 6:30-9 p.m. at the JCC. Participants must commit to the entire 12 weeks. Space is limited to 25 and advanced registration is required by Sept. 23.

This course is offered by the Jewish Community Mental Health Coalition, a joint initiative of JFS and the Rabbinical Association of Greater Kansas City. The course provides caregivers with communication and problem-solving techniques, coping mechanisms and self-care skills needed to deal wit their loved one's mental illness. The course is NOT appropriate for individuals who themselves have a major mental illness.


