# From Your Rabbi... From Your Secretary...



This week I find myself mourning the loss of the man who was my single favorite rabbinic leader in the world - Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks, of blessed memory, former chief rabbi of the United Kingdom. He passed away at the all too young age of 72 from cancer.

I'm not alone in my admiration for Rabbi Sacks. He was probably the most

prominent and beloved rabbi in the world. In an age of such stark denominational divide, it's astonishing the degree to which Rabbi Sacks was respected and admired across denominations.

Rabbi Sacks himself was the living embodiment of the submovement to which I myself identify - Modern Orthodoxy. My alma mater of Yeshiva University is dedicated to the prospect that one can be fully Orthodox in thought and in practice, while also being fully modern in the sense of worldliness and embrace of the best of Western culture. It sounds good in theory - but all too few rabbinic greats actually live up to that paradigm in practice! It's hard to balance tradition and modernity, without one side of that equation becoming inevitably diluted in the process.

Rabbi Sacks was able to straddle that balance better than anyone. He was the foremost spokesman for Judaism in the world. As a public representative of the Jewish religion, he is sadly just irreplaceable. I'll share with you a secret - in general, when I and my rabbinic colleagues are at a loss for sermon material, the goto source for ideas is Rabbi Sacks! I'd encourage everyone to discover his thought, if you haven't done so already, by simply googling his name and finding his teachings, especially on the weekly Torah portion.

I'll conclude by quoting something that Rabbi Sacks said about the greatest philosophical conundrum that there is. This is from an article from Israel National News:

In the video recording of a Zoom Q&A session, a young lady mentions that her mother once asked Rabbi Jonathan Sacks the "ultimate" philosophical question - why do bad things happen to good people, and Rabbi Sacks answered, "I still don't have an answer to that."

"I was wondering if you had any more insight," she asks.

"Yes I do, actually," Rabbi Sacks answers and then pauses. "G-d does not want us to understand why bad things happen to good people." Rabbi Sacks then continues and answers, "Because if we understood, we would be forced to accept that bad things happen to good people. And G-d does not want us to accept those bad things."

"He wants us not to understand," Rabbi Sacks explains, "so that we will fight against the bad and the injustices of this world. And

My family history with Kehilath Israel dates back many years, actually before Kehilath Israel was organized from four previous *shuls*. My grandparents on both sides arrived in Kansas City prior to World War I, with my maternal great-grandparents (Eisen) settling on a farm in Richmond, MO and the other grandparents (Madlof & Fishman) living in Kansas City. My father remembers being

woken up on Saturday mornings to help form a *minyan* at Teferes Israel, where he celebrated his *bar mitzvah*, and Rabbi Solomon marrying my parents in the 1950's at the Bellerive Hotel. My uncle's *bar mitzvah* was held on a record-heat day – for December 25<sup>th</sup> – and there was also a record crowd at the Rockhill location. My parents decided that children in the 1960s should understand the prayers, so chose to send my brother and me to a neighboring synagogue, where I remained a member for over 40 years. Although I still enjoyed the services, the congregation didn't feel very warm, and I rarely saw any graduates from my confirmation class of 60. In the meantime, I was attending K.I. on Saturday mornings with my great-aunt and uncle (Blonsky). I was immediately welcomed to the synagogue and began attending more programs at K.I. than at my synagogue and finally made the switch around 2005.

I have really enjoyed meeting and working with members on a variety of programs and projects and was honored to be asked to serve as secretary of the congregation. In my role I had been responsible for preparing *Kiddush* lunch for Saturday morning services, but that has been curtailed by COVID-19; and for the past several months I have focused on connecting with members, particularly those in assisted living communities or seniors who are limited in their activities.

My fulltime profession keeps me really busy - I am a social studies teacher at Shawnee Mission East, and also sponsor the Student Council and International Club. Over the years I have sold tickets for football, basketball, soccer, wrestling, and been the announcer for gymnastics – I guess I like to be totally involved!

At home I am "mom" to Abby and Dolly, the sweetest little Llasa/Bichons and aunt to my brother's adult kids and their children.

I don't know what the future will bring, but hopefully more members and a long life for Kehilath Israel Synagogue.

# PRAYERWORKS RETURNS TO K.I. SYNAGOGUE - VIRTUALLY

In these unprecedented times of COVID-19, stress, isolation, and pressure, Kehilath Israel Synagogue is excited to announce the resumption of our healing PrayerWorks program. Rather than meeting in person, as it has in the past, it will gather virtually. K.I. member **Sharon Friedman** will facilitate each session.

All members of the Jewish community are invited to join. PrayerWorks will meet at 11:00 am on the second Sunday of each month, beginning December 13th. Email info@kisyn.org to request the secure link.

What exactly is PrayerWorks? Sharon says, "PrayerWorks brings people together to find healing for themselves and for others. At the monthly, hour-long session, we discuss something about healing, health and wellness, then have a small healing prayer service and say *misheberachs* (prayer for healing) for those who need healing. We end with a short healing meditation. The group is open to anyone in need of healing--whether it be from a physical illness or emotional--and those who would like to pray for themselves and others."

Sharon is passionate about the power of communal prayer. She cites these thoughts, written by Rabbi Naomi Levy: "Praying with a community alters us. Often when life hurts we pray by ourselves and assume that we are alone in our pain. When we enter a community to pray, our eyes open up. We see that we are not alone in our pain—there are others who suffer too. And we also realize that we are not alone in the world; there are dozens of people praying for us, extending their arms to help. Suddenly the nature of our prayers begins to change. We stop drowning in self-pity. We stop praying for ourselves alone. Before long we begin adding others to our prayers. We begin praying for our world. We begin to see our own troubles in a new light. Perhaps things aren't as bad as they seemed after all." (Rabbi Levy is the author of two best-selling books: *Talking to God: Personal Prayers for Times of Joy, Sadness, Struggle, and Celebration* and *To Begin Again: The Journey toward Comfort, Strength, and Faith in Difficult Times.*)



About Sharon Friedman, PrayerWorks facilitator: Sharon has always been a seeker of spirituality.

In 1999, Sharon's father passed away after a long illness. She spent months working with her father and her family to help them transition to peace-of-mind and acceptance. After her father's passing, Sharon joined Rickie Haith's Prayerworks group, and later they decided Sharon should begin a second group. That was 13 years ago!

When she became a yoga teacher, Sharon sought ways to connect yoga philosophy to Judaism. In doing so, she studied with two giants in the field, Diane Bloomfield

and Rabbi Myriam Klotz. From them she learned to merge yoga with her Judaism, thus creating a yoga practice that she could share with like-minded others.

Sharon is also a facilitator for *Mussar*, the Jewish practice of self-study and self-improvement. Additionally, she has co-facilitated a course in "Wise Aging," a program which helps adults 55 and over to engage and create m ningful lives.

Sharon is currently in the process of becoming a Yoga Therapist, a certification that includes mind, body and spiritual practices.

#### LAWS AND CUSTOMS OF CHANUKAH

On the first night of *Chanukah*, Thursday, December 10, three blessings below are recited immediately PRIOR to the lighting of the candles (not while lighting them). On all other nights, we recite only the first two blessings.

*Chanukah* candles are placed from right to left side until finally on the eighth night, the *chanukiah* is full. We light the newest candle first; therefore, we always begin by kindling the candle at the left and proceed toward the right.

Shabbat always takes precedence over other holidays; therefore, on December 11, the Friday night of Chanukah, we should light the Chanukah candles first and then the Shabbat candles. Both need to be done by 4:39 pm, and since the Chanukah candles need to burn at least one half hour after dark, it is traditional to use larger candles such as Shabbat candles or tall tapers for the chanukiah. On Saturday night, December 12, one should recite Havdalah first, after 5:34 pm, and then light the Chanukah candles.

For *Chanukah*, one might light either an oil or a candle *menorah*, the only requirement being that whichever type of light is used, it should be clear and bright. There has been a great deal of discussion as to the use of an electric *chanukiah*. Since it is not definite as to whether or not an electric *menorah* fulfills the obligation of the lighting of *Chanukah* lights, it is

best to avoid the use of such a *chanukiah*, except for purely decorative purposes.

In general, on a weekday night other than *Sabbath* night, the *Chanukah* candles are to be lit approximately at dark. If, however, one is not at home or this time is inconvenient, they can be lit at any time during the entire night. If one has to leave home prior to dark and may not return for the rest of the evening, the *Chanukah* candles may be lit about an hour before dark, provided that *Chanukah* lights will burn for a short period of time after dark.

The *Chanukah* candles are to be lit simply for religious reasons and are not to be used for any secular purposes such as lighting other objects, reading lights, etc. The rabbis of old determined that the required burning time of a *Chanukah* candle is one half hour, and after that time, they may be used for any other purpose or even extinguished.

It is customary to place the *chanukiah* in the window of one's home, on the main table around which the family gathers, near the door, or any place where lighting of the candles will become a public event.

The K.I. Fred Devinki Religious School began virtual classes on October 18. The students were very excited about getting to see each other, even if it was online.

We named each of the groups: pre-K through 1st is *Kitah Aleph*; 2nd through 4th is *Kitah Bet*; and 5th through 7th is *Kitah Gimel*.

Kitah Aleph spends about 45 minutes in a virtual class with Morah Tziporah Mazer. They start with morning tefillot. Morah Tziporah started the year with reviewing the fall Jewish holidays and the students got to tell each other what they had done for each of the holidays. # COURSE IN BIBLICAL HEBREW LAUNCHING ONLINE DECEMBER 1 FOR PEOPLE OF ALL FAITHS

A new beginner level course that enables people of all faiths to study the central sacred text of all Abrahamic faiths in its original language will be offered in December.
